In this context, I particularly refer to the nuanced art of non-verbal interaction. Considering that everyone experiences physicality in unique ways, harmonizing different approaches to bodily engagement is critical. This is imperative on a set where not only actors but also camera crews, directors, and other team members share the space.

The establishment of intimacy coordination as a standard practice represents a significant step forward. It guarantees that actors are both protected and supported, allowing them to remain uninhibited and expressive during the filming of demanding and intimate scenes.

From diverse training approaches to the clash between ,nudity riders' and ,risk assessments. Let's uncover the synergies and differences that define this essential role in the global entertainment industry.

Gatekeeping vs. The Golden Standard*

The credibility of the role Intimacy Coordinator was born of the culture shift that ensued post the #metoo resurgence. Intimacy Coordinators are in part meant to create safer and more equitable spaces for everyone by dismantling power imbalances and preventing misuse of authority. Perhaps there is some irony to be found in the title of this panel discussion. Certification has been the standard in legitimizing the role, but certification can be difficult to acquire for reasons such as cost or accessibility. Certifying bodies have an ethical responsibility to support growth in the industry while doing their due diligence in preventing harm. Each organization has established their training protocol with integrity and best intentions. There are also plenty of qualified individuals who have been engaging in this practice on their own for years well before "Intimacy Coordinator" was first credited on screen, and they had been doing exceptional work as intimacy professionals in the entertainment industry. Which practices best serve the highest good for the evolution of Intimacy Coordination? Who is best gualified to set these standards? Who is accountable when these standards are not met? In what ways are they held accountable?

Intimacy Coordination is a one-person department with little support balancing the unique needs and safety concerns of performers, production, and self. This makes it difficult for the role to evolve, let alone reach a "golden standard." Perhaps sharing information is a better way to reach an agreed upon standard, and perhaps reflecting upon experiences together as a community would continue to uplevel that standard to golden status. Gatekeeping information is based in lack and fear, but collective expansion is more likely to create opportunity for growth and legacy.

Belonging and Authenticity*

A conversation with BIPOC IPs from around the globe. Have you ever wondered what your BIPOC colleagues discuss when they share their experience of working in the creative industry together? They often talk about the lack of opportunities they face because of their race, the relationship they have with their white colleagues, who their allies are and who aren't, difficulties in navigating the communication in the language which is not their 1st one, and experience of being "the only non-white person" on set/ rehearsal room...

The last panel at the IC Community Day will have an unconventional format as they – BIPOC speakers – will openly, candidly and vulnerably discuss their concerns, frustrations and experiences about being a "minority", "non-white" and "underrepresented". What it means to belong or not belong. How do they offer their authentic self in a space that they often don't feel "safe".

This conversation is not a Guide "How to navigate difficult situations about race" in your day-to-day life. There will be no data, statistics and learning materials given to make your workplace more inclusive or diverse. They don't represent all the world's BIPOC or marginalized people's point of views. They are prepared to share their personal stories. Are you willing to listen?

Please note that there will be no Q&A session at the end of this panel discussion. I (Haruka Kuroda), the moderator of this space, ask for your compassion and respect their boundaries for not wanting to hear your opinions, questions or explanations on contents discussed during or straight after the session.

"In the face of every image, we have to choose whether, or how, to make it participate in our knowledge and action. We can accept or reject this or that image; take it as a consoling object or as a worrying object; make it ask questions or use it as a ready-made response." Georges Didi-Huberman

Cinema is an empathy machine which allows us to share emotions with individuals whom we may not have had the chance to meet otherwise. The use of image and framing are powerful political tools that help us to understand and connect with people from diverse backgrounds who have been silenced for years.

As contemporary art practice shifts from provoking experimental transgressions to the pursuit of social justice and safe creative process, the issue of balancing artistic vision with fair recognition of marginalized individuals while avoiding biased language is a complex one.

What influence does identity politics have on storytelling? How to navigate bold creative process which are fueled by artists' phantasies without burning anyone involved? In what ways can artists contribute to social change? What compromises with artists' egos must or should be made? What kind of images are common in German TV? Could intimacy coordinators change sexual culture in society?

The subject of a "integrity" is certainly one of the most pressing challenges facing our industry. We invite you to join us for a thoughtprovoking discussion where we will explore various perspectives and seek to gain a deeper understanding of the impact of the intimate images on our societies.
